## "On behalf of the Most Reverend

**Matthew K. Gyamfi**, the Catholic Bishop of Sunyani, Ghana, I thank you for inviting me to conduct our annual Mission Appeal in your parish on the weekend of August 3&4, 2024.

**The Catholic Diocese of Sunyani, Ghana,** West Africa, was established in 1973. It covers an area of 19,500 km<sup>2</sup>. Most of it is situated in poor rural areas, where most of the people are peasant farmers. These areas have lagged behind the rest of the country in education, basic infrastructure, and healthcare delivery. Because of this, the Diocese, when it was created, decided to make social development a major part of and tool for the evangelization of the people in the diocese.

**The faithful are relatively young;** mainly young families. They are mostly first– and second-generation Christians. In many areas, there is need for primary evangelization. Fortunately, the response to the Faith is tremendously encouraging. The people accept the Faith and join our local Church in large numbers. Some people tend to remain in the traditional religion, but the young are accepting the Faith. Thus, our congregation is mainly composed of young people. We have over 300,000 baptized in the Diocese. This number represents a third of those who attend the Church, but do not receive the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist for one reason or another.

The Diocese believes in the holistic development of the human person: primary evangelization, provision of safe drinking water, quality healthcare delivery, and education. In addition to preaching the Gospel, we:

- Drill water wells to provide clean, safe drinking water
- Establish schools at the elementary, high school, and tertiary levels to provide quality Catholic education
- Train and develop the leadership qualities of our local catechists who are at the forefront of our evangelization efforts
- Open new parishes by building new churches and rectories
- Organize vocation rallies to promote vocations to the priesthood and religious life
- Support seminary education of our college seminarians
- Organize workshops on awareness and prevention of diseases such as breast cancer and screening, typhoid fever, HIV AIDS, and many other communicable diseases through our health institutions across the diocese/region

The coronavirus pandemic and the challenging economic conditions of our country have destroyed and halted almost all economic activities in the country. The diocese has been affected financially so much that we count on friends like you for support. Some of the funds we raise in your parish would be used to support the mission of the Diocese including the training of Priests and Religious. Currently, the diocese has 90 Major Seminarians at various stages of Priestly formation in different Seminaries in Ghana and abroad.

Sharing our experiences as a mission Church with your parishioners will ignite and re-invigorate their missionary spirit. Additionally, funds raised in your parish will enable us to better serve the people of God in our local church.

Trusting in your cooperation, we ask the intercession of the Immaculate Virgin Mary and the Lord's blessings for you."

#### HISTORY OF SAINT MARY'S (OUR LADY) OF Czestochowa Church, Blossburg, Pa By Peter Lupkowski



The history of Our Lady of Czestochowa Church and Parish begins before the 1874 founding, with the men and women that followed their faith and dreams to a new country.

Predominately from the Western part of Poland near Poznan these immigrants left their homeland with its economic troubles, famines and religious persecution from continued partition of their country and hoped to find prosperity and acceptance.

In fact there was no country named Poland in the 1860s. From 1795 until after WWI in 1918 a truly independent Poland did not exist.

Imagine living under an occupation for two generations. Being forced to speak another language and have your Polish language, traditions and heritage suppressed. That is the history of our great grandparents and their families. All together a subsistence agrarian life further complicated by oversight by outsiders. And yet keeping the preeminence of your faith and family. Certainly the Polish National Anthem reflects this as it starts out:

Jeszcze Polska nie zginela, Kiedy my zyjemy

Poland has not yet perished, so long as we live. Word had reached Poland that hard work in the United States of America provided an opportunity for many. So with civil war and other troubles pushing them, these peasant families made their way to ports and eventually across the Atlantic in about 1869.

They arrived in the Scranton Diocese and continued the hard work that they knew in their homeland. Spurred by visions of plentiful jobs some settled in Nanticoke and some in Blossburg. Blossburg became a beacon for the travelers as the natural resources were exploited and a demand for workers of diverse occupations seemed limitless. The mines in Blossburg, Arnot, Morris Run, Fallbrook, and Antrim were operating at peak output. The railroad repair shops had just returned to Blossburg and large saw mills, glass factories, and tanneries scattered through the area.

In Blossburg they attended Saint Andrew's Church celebrating Sacraments and sharing in Catholic identity. In fact the first Baptism of a Pole is recorded at St. Andrew's in October 1871. Edward Szpotanski son of Marcin and Malgorzata.

But they had difficulty understanding the Word of God in English and they began to hold religious meetings led by a fellow miner Franciscan Brother Augustine Zeytz with discussion of the bible, sacraments, song, and rosary in Polish. During this time circuit riding priests also made visits on horseback to say mass in Polish, hear confessions, and provide Catholic leadership for these families. They came irregularly from as far away as Shenandoah, Father Strupinski and Cincinnati, Father Kozlowski. Yes, Ohio.

Finally at one of their meetings discussions began about starting a Polish Parish for the faithful. Meticulous minutes were kept and I paraphrase:

After Mass they sought the aid of Father Kozlowski and The Holy Ghost, they began God's work having as their only aim to give spiritual and corporal assistance to our neighbors, and especially to establish a Polish Parish.

That their aim might be realized and be able to fulfill its worthy obligation they decided to choose a patroness. They placed their organization under the patronage of Our Lady of Czestochowa, who is noted for her miracles in the Kingdom of Poland and wish to remain under her care.

Five men gave \$5 each (about \$200 now) and started the work of founding a new parish. Eventually 70 more men and their families joined them and a request was made to the Bishop of Scranton to authorize a new parish in Blossburg. Records of the request show that approval from Bishop William O'Hara was cheerfully given.

Land was purchased for a small church and then a cemetery, both being added to over time. Our parish records show the first child baptized here was Joseph Ignatius Michochonski son of John and Anna on April 4, 1875 by our first resident priest Rev Anthony Klawiter. The first wedding between Ladislaus Milczewski and Julia Stanoszek October 31, 1875. The first funeral service was for the son of Michael and Maryanna Mokrzynski Pawlak. The boy was buried November 25, 1876. Some of you will recall these family names that still live on here. I would also like to mention that the first of 22 priests that came from Blossburg was the son of Edward Szpotanski, the first Pole baptized at St Andrews, Rev Monsignor Stanislaus Szpotanski. Who later worked for the Pope.

Our Lady of Czestochowa became the Mother Church whose pastors administered spiritually to the Poles disbursed through Morris Run, Arnot, Antrim, Redburn (near Ralston) and Trout Run. In fact some complained that their Priest was gone too often tending to the needs of others and they could not have daily Mass here in Blossburg.

"When the breezes sweep through the second growth of forests in the Blossburg Region they may tell of the joys and sorrows of the scores who are lying peacefully in the little valleys hemmed in by mountains: they may bring back memories of colorful ceremonies commemorating Polish historical events; they may speak out with pride which swelled the hearts of Blossburg when they raised the "kopiec" (mound) in honor of President Wilson, the friend of Poles. And may it continue to carry our praise of God." quote from the 75th Diamond Jubilee.
