

WHY DO CATHOLICS CELEBRATE ALL SOULS DAY?

The Church is composed of the faithful living upon the earth and those who have gone before us. The latter includes the Saints in Heaven and the faithful Souls being purified in Purgatory. Just as on November 1st we honor those who are with God, on November 2nd Catholics celebrate a Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed. Also known as All Souls Day, on this day we honor them for their fidelity in life, and we pray for them, since they are being purified before entering the All Holy Presence of God. As Revelation 21:27 says of the Heavenly Jerusalem, "... nothing unclean shall enter in."

DOES THE CATHOLIC CHURCH STILL BELIEVE IN PURGATORY?

From the earliest days of the Church, Catholics have believed in a place of final purification for the faithful who died. Those who died a martyr were recognized as already with God, since they were perfectly conformed to Christ and His Cross by their martyrdom. For the believers who never had the opportunity to give such a public witness, the Church offered prayers, especially the Mass, that having been purified from every imperfection they would enter into Heaven. This can be found in many ancient texts, catacombs, and tombs. In the Middle Ages the theological explanation was developed and the name Purgatory began to be used, since it aptly describes the belief of the Church from the beginning through the present.

All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect. (CCC 1030-1031)

IS PURGATORY BIBLICAL?

The word "Incarnation" is not in the Bible, but all Christians believe the Incarnation is a scriptural belief. The word "Trinity" is not in the Bible, but all Christians believe the Trinity is a scriptural belief. While the word "Purgatory" does not appear in Scripture, the possibility of purification after death certainly does.

Scriptural Principle #1 There is the possibility of punishment for sin even after one has received forgiveness.

(2 Samuel 12:13-18) "David said to Nathan, 'I have sinned against the Lord.' And Nathan said to David, 'The Lord also has put away your sin; you shall not die. Nevertheless, because by this deed you have utterly scorned the Lord, the child that is born to you shall die.' And the Lord struck the child that Uriah's wife bore to David, and it became sick...On the seventh day the child died." David sins. He realizes he has sinned. He repents. He is forgiven; the Lord "put away" his sin. Yet, David receives punishment for his sin; his child dies.

(Matthew 5:25-26) Our Lord advises us to settle our affairs before going before the judge, or else we may be thrown into prison until our debt is paid. "Make friends quickly with your accuser, while you are going with him to court, lest your accuser hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you be put in prison; truly, I say to you, you will never get out till you have paid the last penny."

This is a basic principle of justice—debts of justice must be paid. We cannot pay our debt to God, it is infinite. Christ paid that debt, uniting our nature to His Divine Nature, and we receive for-giveness when we turn to Him in repentance through those whom He appointed for this purpose (*John 20:21-23; 2 Cor. 3:5-6*). The temporal guilt, due to the consequences in us, in others, in the good order of society, remain, and we must settle them to the extent we are able—returning stolen money, correcting injury to someone's good name, asking forgiveness of someone we hurt, physically, emotionally, morally and so on—if not in this life, in the next. It is these debts within our power to repair we cannot simply set aside, whether in life or in death.

Scriptural Principle #2 Nothing unclean (with the stain of sin) will enter Heaven.

(Revelation 21:27) "But nothing unclean shall enter it..." This is referring to the New Jerusalem – Heaven.

Scriptural Principle #3 There is a way, a process, through which the spirits of the "just" are "made perfect."

(Hebrews 12:22-23) "But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem...and to a judge who is God of all, and to the spirits of just men made perfect." Notice, it speaks of the "spirits" of just men (who, as Catholics would say, are those that died in a state of grace), who are in Heaven, and who have been "made perfect."

(2 Maccabees 12:39-46) Judas Maccabee sends an offering to the Temple on behalf of his fallen men who committed a superstitious act. "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." Though the book of Maccabees is not in the Protestant Bible, as it was removed by the Reformers, it nonetheless reflects the faith of Israel in the 2nd century B.C.

Scriptural Principle #4 There is a place, or state of being, other than Heaven or Hell.

(1 Corinthians 3:13-15) "...each man's work will become manifest; for the Day [judgment day] will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each one has done. If the work which any man has built on the foundation [Jesus Christ] survives, he will receive a reward. If any man's work is burned up, he will suffer loss, though he himself will be saved, but only as through fire." Where is this place that a man, after he dies, has his works tested, and could suffer loss, as through fire, but still be saved? Hell? No, once you're in Hell, you don't get out. Heaven? No, you don't suffer loss as through fire in Heaven. It must be somewhere else; purgatory.

A COMMON SENSE PERSPECTIVE ON PURGATORY?

Are you perfect right now? In every single way — physically, mentally, emotionally, and/or spiritually? Do you have any attachment to sin? Never have a bad thought, say a bad word, do something you shouldn't, don't do something you should? Ever get sick?......

God forbid, let's say you were to die this very instant and you were to go to Heaven. Would you be perfect in Heaven? Yes, you would be. You would be perfectly united to the Body of Christ, no more sin, no more pain, no more anguish, no more illness. Your soul would be free from sin and your body — after the Resurrection of the Dead — would be in its glorified state. You would be perfect in Heaven.

Well, think about that. You die imperfect; but you enter Heaven perfect. How did that happen? There was some process by which the spirit of the just was made perfect. Your imperfections were "purged" from you. That process is what Catholics call "Purgatory." **Purgatory is God's ultimate mercy and justice.**

How Can I Help the Souls in Purgatory?

An *indulgence* is a sharing in the treasury of the merits of Christ and the Saints, which the Church applies to the remission of the temporal guilt of sin, whose eternal guilt has already been forgiven in the Sacrament of Reconciliation (by the merits of Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection) (see scriptural basis of Purgatory (at left), *CCC1471*, and *Mt16:13-18*).

An indulgence is a mercy given by Christ through the Church when we do certain acts of prayer, penance, or charity specified by the Church. These works are specified by the Church as capable of obtaining either a *plenary indulgence* or *partial indulgence*; that is, *the full or partial remission of the temporal punishment of sin*. Besides the intrinsic value of the act before God, the Church attaches an additional value through the power of the keys given to St. Peter (Mt16:13-18).

A Catholic may gain an indulgence for his or herself, or for the Poor Souls, but not for another living person—whose will alone determines their receptivity to God's mercy.

To obtain a plenary indulgence for the Souls in Purgatory...

<u>Visit a Cemetery (November $1^{st} - 8^{th}$)</u> And pray, at least mentally, for the souls in Purgatory.

<u>Visit a Church or an Oratory (November 2nd)</u>

And recite one Our Father and one Creed.

Conditions:

- State of grace when performing the above acts
- Complete detachment from sin, even venial sin
- Confession (20 days before or after the indulgenced act)
- Communion (20 days before or after the indulgenced act)
- Prayers for the Holy Father (at least 1 Our Father and 1 Hail Mary) (20 days before or after the indulgenced act)
- Incomplete fulfillment of these conditions yields a partial indulgence.
- One plenary indulgence may be acquired per day. Multiple partial indulgences may be acquired per day.
- In addition to indulgenced acts specified by the Church, any pious prayer, any penitential act, and any charitable act can be done to gain a partial indulgence.

PRIORITIES AT THE POLLS

As Catholics approach the polls, we are asked to weigh many important issues. The U.S. bishops have reaffirmed that "the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed." While they did warn us not to "dismiss or ignore other serious threats to human life and dignity such as racism, the environmental crisis, poverty, and the death penalty," they did give priority to upholding and defending our brothers' and sisters' most basic right—to live.

Abortion tragically ends someone's life when he or she is most vulnerable and most in need of loving protection. Abortion is an intrinsic evil, meaning that it is never permitted or morally justified, regardless of individual circumstances or intentions. The personal and societal consequences of attacks against human life,

whether at its earliest stages or at its final stages, are all the more serious because most often they are "carried out in the very heart of and with the complicity of the family—the family which by its nature is called to be the 'sanctuary of life.'" This is the place where a person should be *most* loved, cherished, and protected.

Catholics are called to defend human life wherever it is threatened and stand up for human dignity wherever it is violated. The enormous number of human lives destroyed by abortion is one factor that elevates its importance. Beginning in 1973 with *Roe v. Wade*, and during the nearly



50-year period after *Roe* in which the Supreme Court forbade state prohibitions on abortion, nearly 64 million children have been killed—and untold numbers of women and men suffer in the aftermath.³

Even with the overturning of *Roe v. Wade* in June 2022, a decision that returns the abortion issue to the electorate, many states continue not to recognize children in their mothers' wombs

as persons warranting protection under the law. Federal laws in our country fail to protect the lives of unborn children, and many political leaders at the state and federal level, work actively to increase access to abortion. Some falsely describe it as health care and even as a basic human right.4

People of good will must boldly stand up against this intrinsic evil, especially when it is occurring on a massive scale, implemented in law and funded, in some instances, by the government. As believers and citizens inspired by the Gospel and guided by the shepherds of our Church, we must



do what we can to end violence in the womb, to ensure that unborn children are fully recognized and protected by our laws, and to support mothers and fathers in embracing life.


PAINT & PRAY
